Attention Aamjiwnaang Members:

Community Services would like to provide the following updates on the developments happening at the Community Centre and Bear Park.

As many may have noticed, a 60'x 24' addition on the south side of the Community Center has already started. This addition will be used to store large items like tables and chairs. It will also be equipped with a garage door, that will allow those utilizing the kitchen to unload under a covered roof, near the kitchen instead of

at the front door of the Community Centre.

FineArtscape Designs has begun work on landscaping changes and upgrades. This will improve the appearance of the exterior of the Community Centre and require less maintenance and upkeep throughout the year.

Lastly, we will be replacing the bridge that goes over Talford Creek to the Wahboose Circle area as it has deteriorated the last couple of years.







Seniors Prescription Drug Coverage

When a senior in Ontario turns 65, their medications are automatically covered by a program called the Ontario Drug Benefit Program. This program charges a

<u>deductible</u> (Client pays for the first \$100 towards their medications every year starting on August 1) and a <u>co-payment</u> (up to \$6.11 per prescription)

If you have status, you do not have to pay the deductible or the copayment. If you are charged a deductible or co-payment at the pharmacy, please provide them with your status card and those charges should be covered by the Non- Insured Health Benefits Program (Indigenous Services Canada). If you end up paying out of pocket, please contact Peggy Rogers at the Health Centre 519-332-6770 ext. 320

We work on and run various fundraising activities:


- Seniors Meat Bingos once a month

As Anishnaabe, our sacred duty is to care for Nibi. When we walk for the water, we embody its continuous flow all day long, beginning with a morning start, touching up throughout, and ending with a touchdown at rest.

We carry asemaa/tobacco to offer at flowing waters, sacred sites, and to honor our relatives in Creation seen along roads or trails. While carrying Nibi, we pray or sing, focusing on meaningful communication. The walk is led by Grandmothers who offer guidance and support.





The Lands & Membership Clerk is responsible for administering the First Nation's Lands Administration and Band Membership Programs within the administrative policies and procedures established by the Director of Operations and as directed by the Lands Management Officer. The Lands & Membership Clerk will have knowledge of Indigenous Service Canada's policies and procedures concerning Indian registration.

Responsibilities

Main Responsibilities:

- Issues Certificates of Indian Status cards; maintains card registry; prepares status and membership reports, as required
- Administer the permit to reside
- Performs such other related duties as may reasonably be required by the Lands Management Officer
- Maintain an effective and efficient filing system

Purpose of the Position

To maintain and ensure a high standard of cleanliness for Aamjiwnaang First Nations – Ganigiiwe - Hospice Like Space.

Responsibilities

The Ganigiiwe cleaning specialist will follow a systematic method to clean, sanitize and disinfect the facility. They will independently complete tasks at the building based on the allotted time. This job involves cleaning Ganigiiwe **once per week** when the building is not occupied and **daily** when the building is occupied.

By focusing primarily on one type of work, the cleaning specialist becomes more skilled, more effective at the job, and more knowledgeable about proper safety procedures for the job. The role involves specific tools and tasks, as well as performance standards.

Cleaning Tasks:

- Empties the trash and recycling bins in the building and disposes outside in garbage storage area at the side of the building.
- Dusts and disinfects all horizontal surfaces.
- Cleans and disinfects telephones, light fixtures, door handles and other frequently touched areas/items.
- Spot cleans all horizontal and vertical surfaces as needed.
- Spot-cleans glass doors and windows.
- Vacuums all rugs in the building.
- · Removes crumbs, ashes or other spills on furniture.
- Repositions all furniture correctly.
- Ability to terminally clean a room, including hospital bed and furniture.
- Turns out lights upon completion of the room and secures area as required
- Cleans/disinfects and sanitizes fixtures and mirrors in washrooms.
- Refills toilet tissue and refills all other dispensers.
- Sweeps and mops the floors.
- Checks all fixtures and makes a note of any damage for report to HCC supervisor.
- Changes burned-out light bulbs
- Cleans the blinds where needed.
- Cleans the washer and dryer
- Operates washer and dryer to clean cleaning items and may assist with laundry as needed.
- Handles light maintenance.

- Extensive experience in all aspects of general cleaning, including window treatments.

JOB SUMMARY

Reporting to the Environment & Consultation Department Manager and working within the Environment & Consultation Department (ECD), the Energy Consultation Coordinator is a full-time (contract) position supporting Caldwell First Nation's Environment and Consultation Department Energy consultation process. This includes coordinating consultation and monitoring Energy-oriented projects across CFN's Traditional Territory via Department-approved processes. The Energy Consultation Coordinator is also responsible for enhancing the Department's capacity in the Energy sector, such as seeking out Capacity Funding Agreements, strategie planning, and helping the Department to develop Impact Benefits Agreements, while at the same time executing community engagement regarding key Energy projects and the Department's rights-based initiatives. While a one-year contract position, the role is multi-year in its outlook and renewal of contract will depend on Department capacity-building and funding. The Energy Consultation Coordinator must understand Caldwell First Nation's specific priorities and work to promote the Nation's vision and values.

CORE COMPETENCIES:

- Commit to in-person project management, community engagement, and tasks both inoffice and in-field, as well as remote or virtual work at the direction of the Department Manager.
- Follow all CFN policies and procedures, as well as ECD guidelines set by the Department Manager
- Pursue continuous learning and development;
