Aamjiwnaang First Nation

Notice is hereby given to eligible voters of the Aamjiwnaang First Nation Indian Band that a General Election poll will be held **Friday October 18**, **2024** to elect one (1) Chief and nine (9) Councillors of the Band, and that such poll will be open from nine (9:00) o'clock a.m. local time until eight (8:00) o'clock p.m. local time at the **Maawn Doosh Gumig Community Centre**, **1972 Virgil Avenue**, **Sarnia**, **ON**, **N7T 7H5**. I will count the votes that same day, Friday October 18, 2024, at the same location immediately after the close of the poll and declare the results of the election.

All members of Aamjiwnaang First Nation, whether they are living on-reserve or off-reserve, who are eighteen (18) years of age or older on Friday the 18th day of October 2024 are eligible voters and may cast a ballot in person or by mail-in.

Eligible voters living off-reserve, for whom a last-known address is made available to the Electoral Officer by the Aamjiwnaang First Nation, shall be sent a mail-in ballot package.

Eligible voters living on-reserve, who for any reason choose not to attend the poll or who are unable to attend the poll in person on Friday October 18, 2024, may contact the Electoral Officer to receive a mail-in ballot after September 13, 2024.

Eligible voters who receive or pick up a mail-in ballot package may attend the poll and vote in person but, in doing so, shall forfeit the count of their mail-in ballot.

Seniors Prescription Drug Coverage

When a senior in Ontario turns 65, their medications are automatically covered by a program called the Ontario Drug Benefit Program. This program charges a <u>deductible</u> (Client pays for the first \$100 towards their medications every year starting on August 1) and a <u>co-payment</u> (up to \$6.11 per prescription)

If you have status, you do not have to pay the deductible or the co-payment. If you are charged a deductible or co-payment at the pharmacy, please provide them with your status card and those charges should be covered by the Non-Insured Health Benefits Program (Indigenous Services Canada). If you end up paying out of pocket, please contact Peggy Rogers at the Health Centre 519-332-6770 ext. 320





- Must show flexibility and creativity and ability to adapt to client needs.
- High level of appreciation and sensitivity to Indigenous issues, beliefs, and values.
- Must have valid drivers licence and reliable transportation.
- · Available to work flexible hours, including evenings and weekends
- Must successfully pass the vulnerable sector screening and criminal record check.

Other Considerations

In accordance with Section 16 Special Programs of the Canadian Human Rights Act, preference will be given to Aamjiwnaang Band Members with relevant education/experience (R.S.C 1985, c. H-6, s16 (1-3).

CHILD AND FAMILY HOME MAINTENANCE & REPAIR

The Child and Family Services Department has access to additional one-time funding to assist families with minor home repairs. The focus is on repairs or modifications needed to address or prevent health and safety issues in the home. The overall goal is to help families provide a safe and comfortable home for the children living in their homes.

Eligibility

- On-reserve homes with band members ages 0 17 years living in the home
- · Homes needing minor renovation or repair to address or prevent health and safety issues
- · Privately owned or Band owned homes
- Up to \$5,000 per home. One-time only. Exceptional circumstances may be considered.

Process

- Homeowner will submit application form and two (2) quotes to the Housing Department.
 Inspections to help determine the scope of work are encouraged and can be scheduled through the Housing Department.
- Applications will be reviewed and approved by a team made up of Child & Family Services, Housing & Public Works/Maintenance.
- Applications will be approved on a <u>first-come</u>, <u>first-served</u> basis until the funding is exhausted
- Inspections are mandatory once work is completed and will be required to issue payment.

Eligible Items – including but not limited to:

Interior Repairs & Modifications

- Install safer flooring
- · Grab bars and handrails
- Install safer tub or shower
- · Install safer toilet
- Replace smoke & carbon monoxide detectors
- Faucet & fixture leaks
- Improved or motion-activated lighting
- · Home safety improvements
- Accessibility modifications

- Ramps and other mobility aids
- Mold remediation
- Appliance replacements (ie., fridge, stove, washer, and dryer)

Exterior Repairs, Upgrades & Maintenance

- · Deck maintenance and repair
- · Install timers, outdoor security and path lighting
- Exterior caulking
- · Minor driveway repairs
- · Clearing hazards from yard, garage, basement
- Repairing leaks
- · Upgrading windows





New Breast Screening Ages!

Ontario Health (Cancer Care Ontario) is pleased to announce that on October 8, 2024, the Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP) will be expanding to offer breast cancer screening to people ages 40-49 (previously 50+). Regular screening can find cancer early when treatment has a better chance of working. Eligible Ontarians ages 40-49 will be able to self-refer to any OBSP screening location, which supports access to screening for people without a primary care provider. The OBSP will encourage people ages 40-49 to make an informed decision about whether vreast cancer screening is right for them by discussing screening with their primary care provider, a Health811 Navigator, or in certain communities, a prevention specialist.

Changes to Cervical Screening Program

The Ontario Cervical Screening Program will be undergoing an important change in 2025, transitioning from traditional Pap tests to HPV testing as the primary method of screening. This shift reflects the latest scientific evidence, showing that HPV testing is more effective in detecting the types of high-risk HPV that can lead to cervical cancer. People immunized for HPV (human papillomavirus) will still require cervical screening.

Who is eligible for the Ontario Cervical Screening Program?

Those with a cervix, aged 25-69, have ever been sexually active, have OHIP coverage, and have no symptoms suggestive of cervical cancer.

Breast Cancer Awareness

>>> A message from Dr. Chintan Shah, MD, CCFP, Regional Indigenous Cancer Lead

Breast cancer is the most diagnosed cancer in women. It is caused when breast tissue cells grow out of control and form a lump or mass. Some risk factors that increase breast cancer risk are drinking alcohol, excess body weight, diabetes, non-therapeutic radiation, some medications, family history and certain genetic conditions.

Some women may have symptoms such as a breast lump, localized tenderness, skin changes, or discharge from the nipple. Therefore, it is critical that patients visit their doctors should symptoms arise and for routine screening.

Screening tests help find cancers early, so there can be a higher chance of treating and curing the disease. Starting October 8, 2024, The Ontario Breast Screening Program (OBSP) will be recommending women ages 40-74 to have a mammogram every 2 years. Those between the ages of 30-60 who are at higher risk for breast cancer (strong family history, genetics, etc) should get a mammogram and breast MRI every year. You can visit your doctor or OBSP centre to discuss screening options.

Luckily, First Nation women have significantly lower breast cancer incidence when compared to their Non-Indigenous counterparts. However, their survival rates from breast cancer are significantly poorer in comparison to Non-Indigenous women. Hence, keeping up with regular screening can help with better outcomes and increase survivorship.

Every child deserves to feel safe, to have access to basic needs and to be protected. You can help make this happen by reporting any signs of child maltreatment. Sometimes children don't how to speak up, we can work together to give children a voice.
